EDUCATION RESOURCE CENTRE (ERC)

The ERC is a library of materials to support you during your practice teaching by providing access to a number of resources and materials exclusively to Faculty of Education students. Resources include manipulatives, Teacher's guides, solution manuals and classroom technology.

The Faculty of Education is certified by the Ontario College of Teachers to deliver AQ/ABQ/PQP courses for certified teachers. As teacher candidates near the completion of their BEd they may register for courses prior to graduation.

Religious Education: Teaching in Catholic Schools. This certificate course is open to anyone applying to the Catholic School Boards in Ontario. Faculty of Education students are eligible to register in their final year of study. This course is not equivalent to Religious Education, Part 1 Additional Qualification (AQ). This is not a mandatory course but is advised if seeking employment with a Catholic School Board (CSB). The CSB may require candidates to be practicing Roman/Eastern rite Catholics. Bachelor of Education (BEd) degree program at York University

Your BEd program is comprised of 60.00 credits (including mandatory courses for your division, practicum courses and elective course requirements) over two years. Generally, teacher candidates will complete 30.00 credits each year (fall and winter term). There is usually an opportunity to complete elective (EDUC) courses during the summer term, thus allowing more time for practicum requirements in Year 2.

It's important to remember that the **BEd** is a full-time academic program that has a very full schedule, and the degree is accredited as an in-person program; with the professional nature of the program and expectations from the Ontario College of Teachers (OCT), it is also expected that teacher candidates attend classes together to enrich their learning experiences and to prepare them to enter the teaching profession.

COURSE ENROLMENT: You are required to enroll in the following courses:

- ✓ May 5, 2025 ED/EDPR 2000 section U 3.00 In-School Practicum (Catalogue #: J62V01)
- ✓ June 19, 2025 ED/EDUC XXXX 3.00 Education Elective (Math or Literacy) enroll in only one elective.

Education Elective Course Options:

- **Primary-Junior** Candidates are required to complete **one math, one literacy** and **one free choice elective** to complete their degree requirements
- Junior-Intermediate Candidates are required to complete one math OR literacy elective and one free
 choice elective to complete their degree requirements.

REMINDER: We will enroll you in the remainder of your Year 1 courses, but **you** are required to enroll in ED/EDPR 2000 so we can enroll you in the rest of the courses.

Required Course Descriptions

EDPR 1000 3.00 Studies in Communities and Their Schools

This course examines education in schools, communities and the broader Ontario context, including differing perspectives on professionalism, relationships, legislation, conflicts, values, community, and knowledge construction within formal and informal contexts in education. It prepares students to enter a workplace as professionals in schools through an understanding of expectations of professional conduct and responsibilities, and a comparison of issues of decolonization, equity, diversity, and inclusion. The course takes place at the same time as BEd students' first school practicum and necessarily pushes them to consider how these policies and concepts are (and are not) realized in practice. The course is only open to students in the Bachelor of Education (BEd) degree program.

ED/EDPR 2000 3.00 Practicum

This course provides the experience of working collaboratively with a mentor in school-based practicum placements. Students will develop strategies and skills for articulating and demonstrating their development as beginning teachers through the integration of theory and practice.

ED/EDFE 1100 3.00 Child Development and Health

How many educators understand the developing child through the wider world? Topics include mental health and family/school life; theories of mind, language, and emotional life; studies of peer and school influence, conflict and care; and sexuality, gender, and race.

EDFE 1101 3.00 Adolescent Development & Health: How many educators understand the developing adolescent through the wider world? Topics include: mental health and family/school life; theories of mind, language, and emotional life; studies of peer and school influence, conflict and care; and sexuality, gender, and race for adolescents.

EDFE 1300 3.00 Inclusion, Disabilities and Education

This course examines the inclusion of children with exceptionalities in the general education classroom. Topics will include inclusion, relevant legislation, differentiation, collaborative practice, instructional technologies and equity issues related to identification, placement and achievement.

EDFE 2000 6.00 Foundations of Education & Theory into Practice. This interdisciplinary course examines the philosophical, historical, and sociological foundations of education. Attention is paid to the socio-cultural, historical and political context of education, with specific reference to the development of compulsory public

schooling and residential schooling in Canada. Students will connect educational theory to their professional practice. Through readings, teaching narratives and casework, students will adopt critically informed approaches to current, multidisciplinary and professional practices of teaching.

This is a blended course, consisting of a few in-class sessions, with the majority being delivered online throughout the academic year.

ED/EDPJ 1000 3.00 Language & Literacy in the Primary/Junior Divisions

This course will facilitate an understanding of reading, writing, oral communication and media literacy in the Primary and Junior divisions with a focus on exploring current thinking about language processes and the implications of these insights for instructional practice.

ED/EDPJ 1100 3.00 Mathematics in the Primary/Junior Divisions

This course examines teaching and learning mathematics in the Primary and Junior divisions. Emphasis is placed on mathematical processes, cross-curricular and integrated learning, and differentiation in mathematics teaching and learning.

EDJI 1000 3.00 Language & Literacy in the Junior-Intermediate Divisions

This course will facilitate an understanding of reading, writing, oral communication and media literacy in the Junior and Intermediate divisions with a focus on exploring current thinking about language processes and the implications of these insights for instructional practice.

EDJI 1100 3.00 Mathematics in the Junior-Intermediate Divisions

This course examines teaching and learning mathematics in the Junior and Intermediate divisions. Emphasis is placed on mathematical processes, cross-curricular and integrated learning, and differentiation in mathematics teaching and learning.

EDJI 2000 3.00 Science and Technology in the Junior-Intermediate Divisions

This course examines developmental theories, epistemic assumptions and pedagogical practices in science and technology in the Junior-Intermediate divisions. Topics include: play, inquiry and problem solving, creativity and wonderment, curriculum analysis, concept development, science and technology within social and environmental contexts.

EDPJ 2000 3.00 Science and Technology in the Primary/Junior Divisions

This course examines developmental theories, epistemic assumptions and pedagogical practices in science and technology in the Primary/Junior divisions. Topics include play, inquiry and problem solving, creativity and wonderment, curriculum analysis, concept development, science and technology within social and environmental contexts.

EDUC 3000 Teaching Religious Education

Using a combination of theology and experiential learning, this non-credit course prepares teacher candidates to teach religious education in Catholic Schools. *TBA in calendar when available, runs fall/winter but not every week*

How to Enrol: Your Step-by-Step Guide

Please note: if you have not enrolled in EDPR 2000, we cannot complete your enrolment.

Access the Registration & Enrolment Module (REM):

Log in to the <u>Registration and Enrolment Module</u> using your Passport York username and password. If you are a new student <u>sign up for a Passport York account</u>.

Please note that it is unacceptable to use computer programs or scripts to gain access to the registration and enrolment system.

You may be blocked at this point from enrolling because:

- you may be logging in incorrectly or you may have used the wrong username and password.
- you are logging on before your enrolment access begins.
- you are not academically eligible to enrol for the session based on your most recent grade report decision.
- you have outstanding debts of \$75 or more to the University.
- the registration and enrolment system is temporarily unavailable;
- it is determined that you have used a computer program or script to access the registration and enrolment system; or
- you try to add, exchange or transfer the same course or section, more than 100 times in a 24-hour period.

Proceed to enroll (add, drop, transfer or exchange courses):

You can now proceed to enrol. There are four enrolment procedures you can do: Add a Course, Drop a Course, Transfer a Lab/Tutorial or Section Exchange a Course

You can enrol in a course. Follow the steps:

- 1. Click add a course.
- 2. Type the catalogue number in the add course field.
- 3. Click the add course button.
- 4. The catalogue number, course and title will be displayed.
- 5. If this is the course you want to add, click yes.

If you are unable to add the course, you will get an explanation.

Course Enrolment Notes

There are multiple sections of many of the courses, and not all sections pertain to your program. Undergraduate Student Services in the Faculty of Education plans to complete your required course enrolments by the end of June/early July 2025. The final schedule will be available in August (if any course sections are changed). Schedules will vary based on section enrolment.

Once your enrolments are complete, you will be able to access your timetable by visiting the <u>York Courses</u>
 <u>Web site</u> and selecting <u>Plot My Timetable</u> from the column on the left.

Criminal Record Check/Vulnerable Sector Screening (VSS)

All Teacher Candidates (TCs) enrolled in a B. Ed program must have a valid VSS for every year in the program. At the start of the program in September, all TCs must have a cleared VSS document with an issued date of no earlier than July 1. TCs need to apply for a new VSS prior to the expiry date of the existing one every year. Processing time should take between 2-4 weeks but can be much longer in cases where fingerprinting may be required. For this reason, TCs should begin the process early to ensure their VSS is never expired. Contact your local Police Services Office to find out how long their processing time is and begin your application accordingly in order to always have a valid document.

Without a clear VSS document, you will not be allowed to participate in practicum.

School boards, practicum schools, community organizations, course directors and practicum facilitators will demand that you show your original VSS document prior to attending your practicum. Always keep your original document with you so that you can produce this document as requested. TCs placed in specific school boards may be asked to forfeit their **original VSS** document. For this reason, you may need to request a second copy at the time of application. Most Police Services will provide a second copy at a nominal charge.

How and Where Do I Obtain a VSS?

TCs must obtain their VSS from the police services office based on where they reside. We have provided the information below for some jurisdictions. If you live in a jurisdiction that does not appear below, please check your local police website, or go to your local police station to request a VSS.

Toronto Police Services has recently launched a new online application system for Police Record Checks – including Vulnerable Sector Screenings. This is the most efficient way to proceed with your VSS application.

You will need a unique organization code to apply. This code is provided upon verifying that you are a <u>Faculty of Education student at York University</u> for the purpose of completing an unpaid practicum placement and that <u>you reside in Toronto</u>. This code is not to be used for any other purpose or shared with any other individual.
